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Teen traffic deaths are on

Only 2 percent of teens realize that nighttime driving is risky, even



though that factor ranks at the top of the list of dangers.

- Only 15 percent regard the lack of seat belt use as being a major contributor to crash injuries and deaths.
- 41 percent could name at least three of the top five driving dangers, 25 percent could name four, and only 3 percent could name all five.
- On a positive note, 76 percent recognized speeding as risky, and 95 percent cited alcohol as a risk factor.

"The students are committed to lessening teen crashes and deaths," says TDS Director Russell Henk. "Like high school students in Texas, they have been overwhelmed with the deaths of friends and classmates, and they are looking to TDS for help. We are proud that they turned to us and are happy that these two high schools have come together to make a difference."

Bristol Eastern and Bristol Central High Schools are the first two schools in the New England area to launch the TDS program and are hoping to gain community support to spread the message to surrounding school districts.

"We all know that teenagers listen to each other much more than they listen to adults," said Joseph F. Marie, Connecticut commissioner of transportation. "What better way then to make them safer on the roadways than to have them carry the message of safety and awareness to each other? That's what Teens in the Driver Seat is about."

From all of us at Teens in the Driver Seat, we welcome Bristol Eastern and Bristol Central High Schools, and look forward to seeing many great things from their students.

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First TDS Summit Update

The first Teens in the Driver Seat (TDS) Summit was a huge success! On October 24-25, the TDS Summit brought 200 people, representing 34 different cities across Texas, to The University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA) campus to learn more about this dangerous epidemic. Teens attended from high schools all over the state, along with representatives from community colleges, school districts, state agencies, cities and private companies. Thanks to everyone who was able to join us—whether in person or through the free online webinar.

The event was kicked off by a press conference from U.S. Representative Ciro Rodriguez. He talked about the severity of the teen driver safety problem and how the TDS program is a key part of the solution. Students from several high schools joined Congressman Rodriguez, along with Dr. Maria Teresa Cerqueira from the World Health Organization. The press conference was followed by a guest appearance from Silver Stars basketball player Sophia Young (#33), who signed autographs for all attendees. Other activities included a formal luncheon, several guest speakers, door prizes, teen group discussions, games and a sharing of ideas.

In addition, teens attending the TDS Summit had the chance to read scripts for a public service announcement that is planned to run on TV stations across Texas in the spring. The "Star Tapings" event was a big hit, with more than 30 stars lining up to read on camera, in both English and Spanish.

Special thanks to the students from Communications Arts and MacArthur High Schools in San Antonio, Texas, for capturing video footage for future public service announcements and driving safety pieces for the Teens in the Driver Seat campaign.

• On October 20, TDS representatives attended the **Mayor's 100 Teens banquet**. The program director has made TDS one of three mandatory programs the 100 teens (selected from various schools in El Paso) must accomplish.

• On October 8, Irvin HS held a Teen Driver Safety Night where area El Paso Independent School District high schools were in attendance including Parkland HS, Chapin HS, Andress HS and Irvin HS. Officer Slade Davis presented material on the effects of drinking and driving and demonstrated its effects with goggles and a "roll-over" cage provided by the Texas Department of Transportation. Jeff Shelton concluded the event with a presentation on TDS.

• On October 22, over 65 teens attended the first-ever TDS club meeting, developed by **Coronado HS**. The school parked a crashed car in front of the school. Lauren Souers, one of last year's Mayor's 100 Teens, is acting president of the club. Speakers are planned for each month to share experiences related to TDS' risk factors.

- Eastwood HS displayed a truck with TDS posters during its homecoming parade. This school is deploying TDS with the help of the wrestling team. Ashley Melero is the TDS leader. She is part of the wrestling team and is an inspiration to all. Being blind is not a disability to her. She knows she can help save lives.
- **Canutillo HS** has made posters along with chalk outlines stressing the importance of the five major risk factors.

• On September 23, a new collaboration began with **Judge Rick Olivo**. Judge Olivo plans to participate in the annual TDS EI Paso summit next year. Judge Olivo brings a new perspective to the TDS program, giving insight into the consequences of teenage traffic tickets, car accidents and fatalities.

Dallas/Fort Worth/Tyler TDS Rep. Christie Madsen

- On September 29, Lindale HS hosted a leadership meeting for the surrounding FCCLA schools. Christie Madsen was invited to speak about the TDS program.
- Creekview HS students created 8-foot distraction boards for the hallways of their high school in order to help their peers learn about the top distractions teens face behind the wheel. The TDS group also handed out "Don't Drive and Text" stress phones to the crowds at a local football game, courtesy of their local State Farm agent.
- Everman HS sponsor Lisa Hollinger found a costume at a garage sale that fit the TDS theme. It was a crash test dummy. The students have begun to integrate this new tool in the form of a mascot for their TDS program.
- Thanks to **Azle HS** and **Creekview HS** students for their participation in focus groups to help keep the TDS program updated with the teen perspective.
- Creekview HS participated in a "distraction relay" by making cars out of boxes and rolling chairs. One hand had to be on the steering wheel at all times while they juggled distractions —like eating, texting, or finding a song on the iPod. This reinforced the dangers of distracted driving.

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- **Brady HS** is making posters and a calendar. The fashion merchandising class is working on T-shirts that say "seatbelts are stylish."
- Bronte HS students made posters for Safety Week and Red Ribbon Week. During Red Ribbon Week, they had guest speakers on teen driving safety and drug and alcohol safety. On Halloween, they simulated people dying from car accidents and had them sit in a pep rally to show the number of student lives that could be affected. For two weeks, they read driving statistics and facts during announcements. Their multimedia class is making two videos. One video is for elementary students about watching for drivers when riding a bike. The second video is for driving during prom and how distractions cause wrecks-covering all five top risks.
- Sterling City HS has made October "Driving Safety" month. The students made announcements with driving facts every other day and put flyers on lockers with the TDS promotional items. They also drew body outlines on the sidewalk.
- Albany HS made a display window in the main hallway of the high school to highlight the dangers of driving at night to coincide with Halloween. The students plan to highlight each risk individually.


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- **Connally HS** is starting up its TDS program as a second-year school for the 2008-2009 school year.

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
Teacher Highlight

TDS is a peer-to-peer program, but each teen group has at least one strong support for their program—their adult school sponsors. Suzanne Reese is one of these remarkable TDS sponsors.

Mrs. Reese, for the second year, is leading the outstanding group at Creekview High School in Carrollton, Texas. In addition to her full class schedule, she also teaches a leadership class and sponsors the TDS group. Mrs. Reese holds her students to the highest standards in all areas of leadership, and this skill has earned her the school-wide nickname of "Mama Reese." During her tenure, her team has produced many brag-worthy ideas. Her students designed a 4-foot-long taco and an equally large make up compact case with matching application brush. These and other items were hung in the main hallway of the school with a sign that read "Distractions Kill." Mrs. Reese's 2007-2008 TDS team spread the TDS message in a unique and touching way. At prom, they invited several of the students from the Special Education Department to stand at the exit doors after prom and hand out TDS air fresheners and key chains to each student. As they received the item, the special guests told them, "Please drive home safely so we can see you at school on Monday."

Mrs. Reese also finds ways to creatively raise funds for her student projects. With State Farm being a state-wide sponsor of the TDS program, she contacted a local State Farm agent and asked for sponsorship of her students' idea. As a win-win result, the TDS team received foam squeeze cell phones that read "Don't Text and Drive" while the State Farm agent marketed his contact information, which was printed on the back of the phone. Using their football game crowd as a platform, they tossed the toy phones into the crowd and reminded the attendees over the speakers to drive safely and not be distracted by their cell phones.

"Mama Reese" does many things to support her wonderful group of leaders in getting the message out about safe driving, but her personal touch is most impressive. On afternoons, Mrs. Reese reminds her students that they are important to her and they need to be careful so she can see them the next class day. Thank you, Suzanne Reese, for your hard work, dedication and support of the TDS program!

The Teen Perspective

As the beginning of this school year started, our group became members of Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA). Our teacher, Mrs. Carolyn Schlueter, had visited with Christie Madsen (Teens in the Driver Seat) during her summer conference and asked her to come to our class as a guest speaker. After the presentation by Ms. Madsen our group became excited as we realized this would be an excellent project for our spring regional competition.

Ms. Madsen showed us her slide show, gave a wonderful presentation about Teens in the Driver Seat and asked us to become involved. We got excited about spreading the word. We received permission from the principal to implement the program at our school. Our presentation will be seen by the drivers ed classes at Azle High School and we also hope to work with "Shattered Dreams" this year to spread the word about teens and driving.

We also had the opportunity to attend the first Teens in the Driver Seat Summit in San Antonio. We were addressed by U.S. Representative Ciro Rodriguez and the Pan American/World Health organization in addition to other speakers concerning statistics of teens and teenage driving. We have been busy keeping a file and compiling information and statistics to make Azle teen drivers more aware of the leading cause of death for teenagers.

A local ExxonMobil station in our community has also donated \$500 to help us implement this project in our school. The check is a grant that is given to a school wishing to implement a program to benefit students. We think it was perfect timing and a perfect fit for our presentation.

We are currently recording a video to present to the drivers ed classes and get the word out about Teens in the Driver Seat via MySpace. We also plan to have a car mechanic speak to students about cars they may have worked on that have been involved in fatal crashes and perhaps ask a local tire shop to come to the high school and check the tires and air in student vehicles for safety concerns. We have many plans to work hard to make sure our teens know how to drive safer.
